In April and October, the Ladies Auxiliary held its biannual Rummage Sales. Thank you to the Ladies

CHRIST CHURCH ARCHIVES

1984 FUND RAISING FOR THE CHRIST CHURCH RESTORATION PROJECT

n 1984 Christ Church was undergoing a much needed "restoration." Among other problems, some of the exterior siding needed to be replaced, the front porch was deteriorating and large portions of ceiling and wall plaster had cracked loose and fallen on to the pews and floor, fortunately not during Sunday services! An engineering firm had already drawn up plans and a goal of raising \$100,000 was set for repairs and restoration of the building. Apart from soliciting donations, various fundraising activities were undertaken.

A somewhat common and popular fundraising strategy at that time was to offer a "drive about" historical building tour to the general public and charge a fee. The fundraising committee held the tour on Saturday, October 3, 1984 with the donation set at \$5 per person (with a 10% discount for senior citizens!). The tour featured a dozen or so homes and churches in the Town of Duanesburg. The starting point was, of course, Christ Church, the oldest unaltered Episcopal church in New York State, where a presentation was given, donations collected and maps distributed indicating the suggested route to follow around town to each landmark.

The presentation at the church described the founding of the Town of Duanesburg by James Duane in 1765 and his dream of creating a 10 acre Town square with four churches on "Church Hill" as

the current location was called for many years. Also included was the history of Duane's construction of Christ Church in 1792-93, it's consecration (1793) and a description of the architectural features of the building. That Duane and his family are at rest in the crypt under the church was also included.

Several members of the Christ Church congregation owned and occupied historic homes at that time and volunteered their homes for inclusion on the tour. It is less likely that home owners today would open their dwellings to strangers who were there to look around but 40 years ago it was not so much of a concern and it was for a good cause! Members of the congregation whose homes were on the tour include:

Mrs. Clark Fleming, Route 7 Duanesburg hamlet, Mr. and Mrs. Sherwin Schrade, also residing in the hamlet across the road from the Fleming residence.

Mr. and Mrs. John Miller, Rt. 7 Quaker Street, a home used as a stop in the Underground Railroad.

Mr. and Mrs. Steven Schrade, Eaton's Corners, whose home had been an inn during the 19th century.

The old Christ Church rectory on Rt. 20 west of the church, owned at that time by Mr. and Mrs. John Schroeder. The home included the small chapel still in mostly the same condition as it had been when the Rector lived there.

Other sites on the tour included the Quaker Street Bible Church and the Methodist Church in Delanson along with the High Cliff Farm. High Cliff Farm had formerly been the winter home of many mules who worked hauling barges on the Erie Canal. In the 80s the farm was still hosting four legged guests, future race horses, for Saratoga and other racetracks.

The restoration project in the early 1980s was generally successful. The interior walls were almost completely replastered and painted, the front porch was rebuilt and rotten portions of the sills were replaced along with deteriorated siding. One aspect

of the project did not "take" and that was the attempt to level the floor in the church. The pillars underneath the floor joists keep heaving and moving the floor up or down thus creating the uneven surface we still have today.

The historic site tour likely only generated a few hundred dollars toward the restoration fund but it brought attention to the community of Duanesburg and beyond of the importance of preserving perhaps the most important landmark in the Town of Duanesburg. **

FEAR NOT BY DEACON DEBBIE

n Christmas day I gave a sermon based on "A Charlie Brown Christmas" which aired for the first time in 1965. I think the most iconic part of the show is when Linus explains the true meaning of Christmas, taken from the Gospel of Luke. Linus Van Pelt stepped out onto the stage and began to recite the story of our Savior's birth: "And there were in the same country shepherds abiding in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. And, lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them: and they were sore afraid. And the




