INTERNATIONAL SPACE STATION

hen my sister, Pamela, and brother-in-law, Harvey, were with us in July an alarm went off on Harvey's phone. It was a notification that the International Space Station (ISS) would be passing overhead in 5 minutes. Mtr. Laurie and I got very excited and ran out to see the little dot of light moving quietly across the sky. Immediately Mtr. Laurie downloaded the app to her phone and when the ISS passes across the night sky, and it is not always visible, we get a notification and head out to look for it!

Many times in the Biblical story what was happening in the sky was a sign of an event that was happening or about to happen on the earth. The most famous 'heavenly sign' is the Star of Bethlehem which led the wise men to where Jesus was born.

The ISS is not a sign that God is going to do anything, but it is a remarkable sight to see. Watching it each time has also focused my thoughts on the wonderful universe and multiverses that God has created. William North was a vestryman at Christ Church and his memorial plaque is located on the east wall of the Church's sanctuary. Also, a NYS historical marker to recognize North is located along Route 20 in front of Christ Church and his remains are entombed with others of his family in the crypt beneath the church building. \blacksquare

A Soldier's Story

In June of 2022 Orlando and Yvonne Orsini of Scotch Ridge Road, Duanesburg, NY donated a WW I Army uniform to the Duanesburg Historical Society. They found the uniform in their attic and although they did not know who the uniform belonged to, they were aware that there was a "sad" story associated with the uniform – but did not know the details.



Walter A Looman

From what we know, Walter August Looman was the only person associated with the farm who served in the army during WW I. At the time of his induction, he was living in—Schenectady—and worked for the Hudson Food Products Co.

Walter was inducted March 1, 1918, at Camp Green, North Carolina. He was assigned to Company "L", 39th infantry, fourth division regulars. He sailed on the SS Lenape, May 10th, 1918, from Hoboken N.J. and was killed in action in the Battle of

Argonne, France, September 26, 1918. Walter was buried in the Meuse-Argonne American Cemetery in France. A cross was erected at his grave in Meuse-Argonne and a monument (cenotaph) was placed in Vale Cemetery in Schenectady, NY.

The uniform and his possessions were most likely sent to his mother, Minna, back home where they stayed in her possession until her death in 1947 and then given to Wiley Looman, her son and brother of Walter A. Looman and thus wound up in the attic of the home Scotch Ridge Road for the Orsinis to find-

The Soldiers Lullaby

William North served as an officer in the continental army during the Revolutionary War which ended in 1783. That year the Society of the Cincinnati formed by a group of former officers. North was an original member. The Society of the Cincinnati still exists and is now the nation's oldest patriotic organization,



headquartered in Washington, D.C. It promotes knowledge and appreciation of the achievement of American independence.

In 1787, North married Mary Duane, the daughter of James Duane and built a home in Duanesburg, Together, they had six children. He served as a state assemblyman and as a senator in Washington during his political career.

The following song was written by William North and sung at a meeting of the Society of Cincinnati in 1824.

The war-worn Soldier, poor and friendless,
Lifts to heaven a suppliant eye;
His Country's free—He did his duty—
Sweet thought! To grief 'tis lullaby,
Lullaby, lullaby, lullaby, lullaby.
Sweet thought! To grief 'tis lullaby.

What though age and care oppress him,
And piercing pains wring forth a sigh,
His duty done—the sweet remembrance,
Shall sooth him with its lullaby.

Lullaby, &c.

His food though scant, his raiment rags,
His bed the earth, his roof the sky,
His duty done—the sweet remembrance,
Shall sooth him with its lullaby.
Lullaby, &c.

When the weary March is ended, And, Halt! Is ordered from on high, Angels gathering round the soldier, Shall sing his requiem, lullaby. Lullaby, &c.
